IMPROVING QUALITY OF LIFE FOR SENIORS

Since 1986, YWCA-SGV Senior Services, formally known as Intervale, has focused on reducing the risk of institutionalization, food insecurity and service barriers for older adults. Our programs touch the lives of older and/or functionally impaired adults in eastern Los Angeles County more than any other community-based organization.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

- Home Delivered Meals provide healthy options to homebound seniors.
- Group dining at various senior centers provides social connection and fosters friendship. Due to COVID-19, group dining service was converted to Home Delivered Meals or distribution pick-up.
- Case Management services include care planning, daily interaction, referrals to legal, transportation and mental health services and an integrated continuum of services.
- Wellness check calls to seniors are a consistent point of contact, reassurance and access to resources.
- Community Outreach is conducted in order to disseminate program information on services available to clients from all diverse backgrounds.

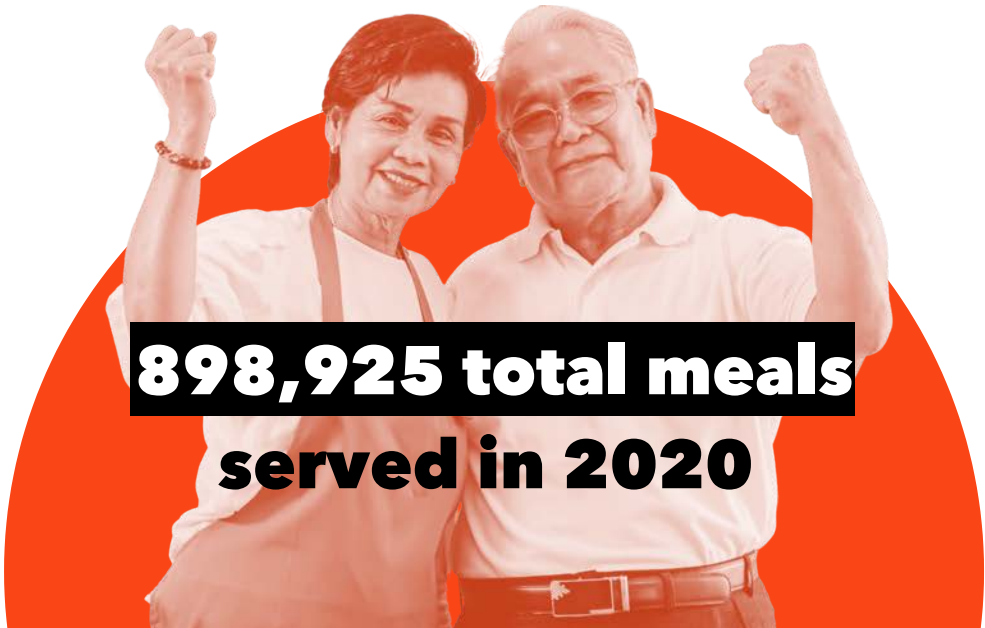
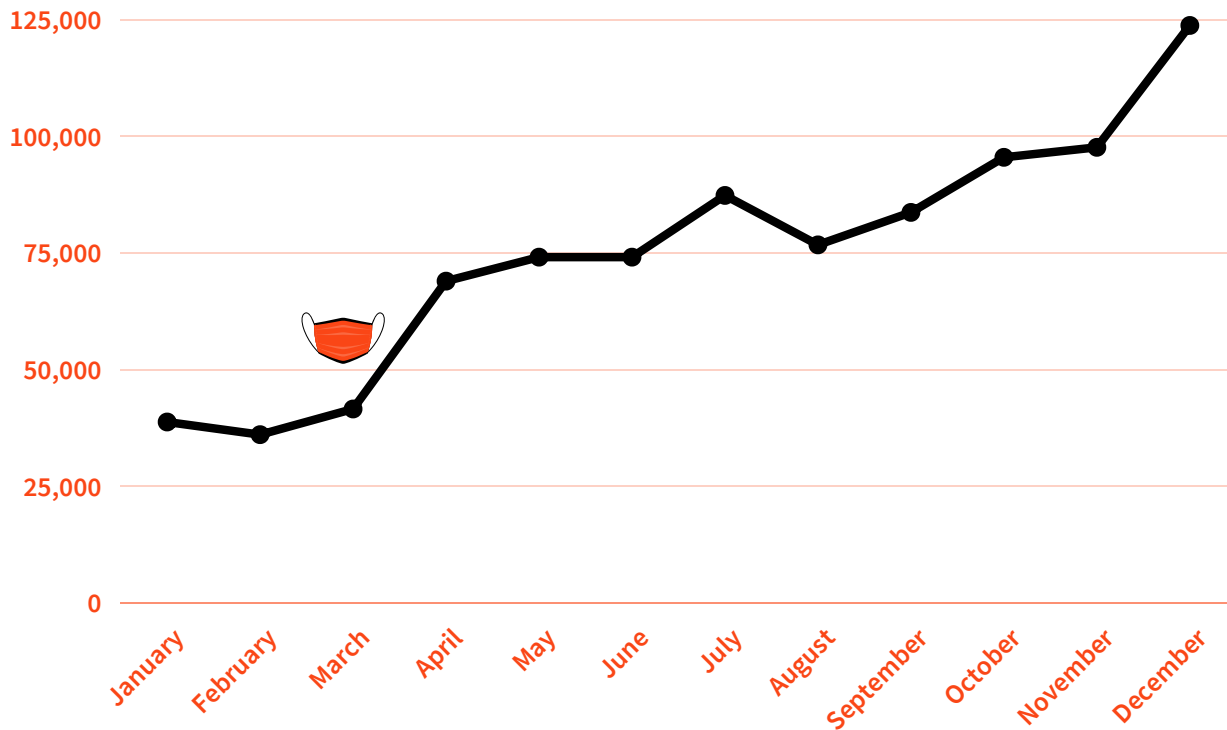

Lucia's advice to small business owners during this time is to "work hard and don't think too much. Sometimes it's a lot of pressure, a lot of worry, but I give everything to God. We are happy we are still alive and healthy. Don't give up!"

Senior services case manager, Beatriz, validated Ms. Stevens' concerns and enrolled her in our supportive services. Beatriz provided advocacy on Ms. Stevens' behalf in order to assist with her basic needs.

YWCA-SGV provided rental assistance and internet access for her. Beatriz helped Ms. Stevens apply for unemployment and utility assistance. Ms. Stevens obtained self-sufficiency and continues to live in her home. Most importantly, she now has hope. Ms. Stevens thanked Beatriz for validating her concerns and advocating on her behalf.

The purpose of YWCA-SGV WINGS Domestic Violence (DV) and Prevention program is to help DV survivors and their dependent children move out of crisis and toward safety and autonomy. Since 1979, YWCA-SGV WINGS has operated the second largest DV shelter in Los Angeles County.

COVID-19 CRISIS RESPONSE

The YWCA-SGV WINGS Shelter faced many challenges during COVID-19 pandemic and quickly adapted to the families' needs.

The WINGS Shelter staff prepared residential children for remote school and collaborated with local schools to provide meals during the day. The staff utilized hotels to ensure new families were able to quarantine and get tested.

As the agency enforced the LA County Stay at Home order, counseling groups met over the phone and social distancing was the utmost of our priorities to ensure the well-being of the families.

HOW WE DO IT

The YWCA-SGV WINGS Shelter offers children's groups designed to create a healing environment for youth and teens, where they are taught the tools to **express themselves, learn empathy, and solve their problems peacefully** at school, in their community and while in the YWCA-SGV WINGS Shelter program. We engage with children and youth through art, music, and play therapy, counseling and remote learning support. All of the children's groups aim to improve mental and behavioral health, well-being and **break the cycle of intergenerational violence.**



After 15 years of marriage, Theresa* and her four children entered the YWCA-SGV WINGS Shelter while she was pregnant with her fifth child. She left her abuser after 15 years of marriage. Theresa faced many obstacles including immigration status, language barriers and lack of support system. She successfully completed the emergency shelter program and was accepted into the transitional housing program. While in the program, Theresa gave birth to her fifth child and because of the quick delivery, the child was born in the shelter! Due to COVID-19, the family remained in the program for over a year.

During that time, Theresa and her children accessed a wide variety of resources. The children attended school and participated in many activities such as being on sports teams and attending dances. They were involved in children’s program services and individual counseling. Theresa also engaged in individual counseling and group sessions. She began working while in the program and was able to buy a car. The YWCA-SGV WINGS Shelter staff created business cards for her cleaning service, allowing her to become self-sufficient.

Theresa then found an apartment for her family and the YWCA-SGV WINGS Shelter was able to provide essentials for their new home.

RACIAL JUSTICE INITIATIVE

Amidst a global pandemic, the summer of 2020 marked a turning point in national conversations about the history of racism and violence in the U.S. Following the murders of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor and Ahmaud Arbery, public protests and demands for equity revitalized a movement that helped direct more attention and funds toward racial justice.

YWCA-SGV has been on a lifetime quest to eliminate racism, stand up for social justice and empower communities. In 2020, YWCA-SGV focused on education and awareness campaigns, staff trainings and formed an internal Racial Justice Task Force. With the increased momentum and support around racial justice initiatives, the YWCA-SGV will seize the opportunity to imagine new and more ambitious approaches to achieving our mission.
