According to Help the Children, Gerri Guzman organized the largest food donation in this organization's 12-year history of distributing food to more than 130,000 economically disadvantaged families each month.

While serving as school board president of Montebello Unified School District in April 2009, Gerri became deeply concerned about the many families struggling to feed their families. Determined to "make a difference," she coordinated the District's 1st Annual War on Hunger Food Drive. She rallied business leaders, the PTA, students, and parents for assistance. Within four weeks, 29 schools collected 30,000 pounds of dried beans, rice, cereal, pasta, and canned goods, which were distributed to Los Angeles County families.

A lifelong learner and advocate of education, Gerri played a key role in garnering support for the 2004 school bond Measure M. This bond provided \$98 million in state matching funds to Montebello Unified to relieve overcrowding, finance renovations, and introduce state-of-the-art technology.

As a California State Certified Alcohol and Substance Abuse counselor, Gerri volunteers her time to help students and families address problems drug and alcohol problems. Also, she has served on the board of the local Boys and Girls Club and the American Red Cross.

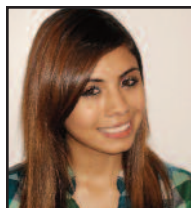
Gerri is an energetic and outspoken public servant, committed to strengthening families, children, and schools in our community. ■

Seventy-two percent of people over 65 live at or below poverty level, according to a needs assessment conducted by the San Bernardino County Department of Aging & Adult Services. The study also determined that these seniors need hot nutritious meals in order to continue living independently in their own homes as long as possible.

As volunteer program manager for Montclair Meals on Wheels, Margaret "Peggy" Banas plays a critical role in helping seniors stay in their homes by providing these essential meals.

She takes calls requesting Meals on Wheels seven days a week and oversees consistent meal delivery Monday through Friday, including holidays. To ensure quality service, Peggy visits her new recipients in their homes, evaluates their nutritional needs, and develops dietary plans that address their medical conditions.

She is responsible for training new drivers and connecting with all drivers each morning to verify recipients for the day. To stay connected with her recipients, Peggy takes time from her busy schedule to deliver meals herself. She also assists with recordkeeping and volunteer recruitment.

Peggy has volunteered over 3,700 hours of service since she became Program Manager in 2006. "My greatest joy is helping others," she says. "From my work experience to now, I have tried to make a difference in other people's lives." ■



YWCA SGV Taps New Resources to Maintain Services

During a challenging year for many non-profit organizations, the YWCA SGV managed to tap into private grants and federal jobs programs to maintain a high level of service for senior citizens, youth and domestic violence victims. Heightened public relations efforts, such as a this monthly newsletter and updated program brochures, also helped the organization increase its visibility in the community.

That's the message board members and other key stakeholders heard at the recent annual meeting, where YWCA SGV Executive Director Lisa Brabo and program directors provided an overview of the past year's accomplishments.

"Along with our critical ongoing government contracts, we have actively pursued and been successful in accessing significant funding from private foundations for the first time in many years," notes Lisa Brabo. "The federal stimulus program also provided us with 12 temporary employees who have helped us maintain services."

In 2009-10, the YWCA was awarded \$172,000 by foundations and corporate grant programs. Already in the 2010-11 fiscal year ending June 2011, more than \$225,000 has been awarded.

Board President Miki Carpenter recognized the contribution of YWCA SGV volunteers, including presenting the President's Award to board member Teresa Figueras. Vivien Hao was also recognized with the Volunteer of the Year Award for her contributions to the agency's public relations and marketing efforts.

Program priorities for this year include providing longer shelter stays for domestic violence victims and offering more financial empowerment workshops for the community.

Other goals are to translate agency brochures into Spanish and developing technology solutions to increase the efficiency and tracking of domestic violence and senior services programs.
